He had no choice but to turn to the gods and Buddhas, so he climbed Mt. Tateyama and prayed with all his heart.

That night, in his dream, Amida Buddha taught him how to make a miracle medicine.

He hurried home, but his mother had already died just before he arrived.

Despite his sorrow, the samurai compounded the medicine and poured it into his mother's mouth.

And guess what?

Amida Buddha told him, "It's too early,"
